






















Editor Note:

Daily Baby Formula Collection Sites Now Open in Town of Oyster Bay

The collection sites are open until July 15.
Operating hours are Monday through Friday from 9 a.m. to 4:45 p.m.

OYSTER BAY, NY — Following success at local weekly baby formula collection drives, the Town of Oyster Bay has opened daily collection sites for families in need.

Residents are encouraged to donate unexpired, unused formula at Town Hall North (54 Audrey Ave., Oyster Bay) and Town Hall South (977 Hicksville Rd., Massapequa) until July 15. The collection sites are open Monday through Friday from 9 a.m. to 4:45 p.m. The Town says all donations will benefit families who are struggling to find baby formula amid a nationwide shortage.

"The nationwide baby formula shortage is causing a crisis for many families throughout Long Island," said Town Councilmember Steve Labriola. "We all know that once little ones move onto food, families are often left with extra formula in their pantries. We ask that you open your hearts and cupboards by donating unexpired, unused formula for families facing shortages and empty store shelves." For weeks, the Town has been partnering with local mothers to set up collection drives in nearby communities.

At the start of the pandemic, Massapequa resident Carmela Shimansky launched a Facebook page, called One Parent to Another, to help parents in need of baby formula and other childcare necessities. Working with neighbors and friends in the community, Shimansky connected with local moms who had items they no longer needed and asked them to pay it forward by donating them to others.

"The goal here is really to help those families who can't get to the stores, who can't go from place to place trying to find what they need," Shimansky said.

"We hope to reach as many people as possible so that they can provide for their families."

Town Supervisor Joseph Saladino said: "We're proud to partner with local moms to collect unopened baby formula and safely distribute it to local families who can't find these important products on the shelves at local stores. While the nationwide shortage has been dreadful for families of newborns, we're very fortunate to have goodhearted community volunteers who stepped up to make a positive difference in the community."

Tosses complete game, hits two-run double in Nassau II

ToniAnn Adamo got off to a shaky start on the mound, but adjustments and a positive attitude helped her right the

ship.

Hicksville defeated Bellmore JFK, 5-2, on Tuesday night at Hicksville in Nassau Conference II softball. Adamo pitched a complete game and hit a double that scored two runs.

"It's a lot of pressure when they get on, but I knew I had to adjust," Adamo said. "I had to hit my spots, just go through all my pitches."

Bellmore JFK jumped to a lead quickly. Olivia Toto led off the game with a bunt single and Gianna Costaro hit a booming double to drive Toto home

and give the Cougars a 1-0 lead. Costaro went 2-for-3 with two doubles.

After Costaro took third on a wild pitch, the complexion of the game shifted. Hicksville leftfielder Heather Mane caught a fly ball for the second out and fired a strike home to get Costaro out at the plate.

"I got scared for a moment because I thought she was safe," Mane said with a laugh. "I just got behind the ball and threw it as hard as I could."

Adamo walked three in the second, but an out-of-turn batter fizzled the Cougars' rally. The Hicksville bats woke up in the third inning when Gabby Smith hit an RBI triple to drive in Angelina Avila and tie the score. Ashley Pierce then hit a single to drive in Smith and give Hicksville a 2-1 lead.

Adamo broke the game open in the bottom of the fourth when she hit a two-run double down the right-field line off Bellmore JFK's Sami Levine. That gave

Hicksville a 4-1 lead and needed breathing room.

"I knew I was hitting it too early, so I waited and ripped it down the line," Adamo said. "I'm a puller, so usually I'm

going to left."

Bellmore JFK got a run back in the top of the sixth when Levine's squeeze bunt scored Toto. Hicksville (5-2) responded in the bottom half of the inning when Avila's groundout drove in a run.

Adamo took the mound in the seventh and retired the Cougars in order to finish off the complete-game victory.

"Toni started off having a tough time hitting spots," Hicksville coach Rich Hinnerschietz said. "When she settled in and started to hit spots, they had a tough time putting a good bat on the ball."



Hicksville History taught



Supervisor of Social Studies & Home and Career Ms. Rose Borda and Hicksville High School social studies teacher Mr. Kevin Bunting brought Hicksville historian and Hicksville Public Library librarian Mr. James Janis to Hicksville High School to speak to the students in the New York State of Mind social studies class.

On March 23 and March 24, James Janis, Hicksville historian and librarian from the Hicksville Public Library, visited Mr. Kevin Bunting's "New York State of Mind" social studies class. Sixth period students learned about the history of Hicksville from the mid-1800s

through present day. Mr. Janis shared an array of images while sharing oral stories of Hicksville from past to present. Mr. Janis' presentation focused on the changing landscape of the Hicksville community from focusing on the town center, architecture of unique buildings and how they changed over time, business development to include at one time thirteen hotels, expansion of the Long Island Railroad to end in Hicksville because they ran out of money to further expand it, a population explosion of the Hicksville community, and how local and world history impacted these occurrences. Mr. Janis provided a wealth of knowledge to the students of Hicksville High School, and the presentation was enjoyed by all.



Mr. Janis, Hicksville historian, speaks of the origin of the Hicksville Public School District and shared various early one-room school house images with students from the days before the district evolved to current day with multiple schools including both the Hicksville Middle School and Hicksville High School as separate buildings.




